
THE CONGRESSIONAL FIRE SERVICES CAUCUS

Background

The Fire Caucus is one of the largest congressional caucuses.

Established in 1987, the caucus is intended to educate members of Congress on issues affecting the fire and emergency services and work with them to find ways to address these issues in a manner that benefits local fire departments all around the country.



Bipartisan and Bicameral

- The 8 co-chairs (4 in the House and 4 in the Senate) are **evenly divided** between Democrats and Republicans
- Chairmanship of the caucus rotates every two years between a Democrat and a Republican

No Required Votes

Being a member **does not require taking positions on legislation**. The caucus is not about ideology, but rather recognizing and supporting our nation's first responders.
